Diabetes Corner:

How do I know when I have poor circulation in my feet and legs?



The hallmark sign of poor circulation is pain or cramping in the calf or the thigh (usually the calf) that occurs when you walk a short distance. This pain is a sign that the muscles are not getting enough oxygen. If you slow or stop and rest for a few minutes, the oxygen supply usually catches up with the demand and then you can walk a little further before the pain

reoccurs. The medical term for this condition is "intermittent claudication." Other signs of poor circulation can be pain at rest, nonhealing ulcers, absent or weak pulses in the feet or legs, a decrease in blood pressure in the feet and legs, or a lack of hair growth on the lower legs. A blue or purplish color, especially when your feet are hanging down, and having cold feet are also signs of circulation problems. If you think you have poor circulation to the feet, ask your provider to evaluate it. Poor circulation is caused by a blockage in the arteries supplying blood to the feet. The blockage may need to be removed or bypassed with vascular surgery. A simple treatment is to walk every day. This exercise can force the blood vessels to expand and improve the circulation in your feet and legs.

Altogether there have been four Zone projects for the Sure Sight Device.

Lions, the more times you use this new Sure Sight Device the better you will become in using it. Also, Lions, it is important to perform screenings in more schools and private Day Care Centers. Last Lion year the District performed over 2,500 eye screenings. The population of Delaware is over 850,000. Lions, it would be as shame to use these devices one or two times and let them sit the rest of the year. Asbestos Exposure & Associated Health Risks:

Asbestos is a naturally occurring mineral that also happens to be extremely hazardous to human health. Previous exposure to asbestos is the only known cause of [malignant mesothelioma](#), a fatal type of cancer that attacks the lungs and has no known cure.

Prior to the 1980s, when the federal government and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) first implemented asbestos usage regulations, products containing asbestos were widely used due to their excellent insulating abilities. Found most often in the form of attic insulation, asbestos was also utilized in the development of roofing tiles, drywall, acoustical plaster, stucco, floor and ceiling tiles and even automobiles. When asbestos-containing products are damaged during a renovation project or as a result of a fire or flood, tiny asbestos fibers become friable and may be released into the air, putting individuals present at risk of inhalation.

If inhaled, the grip-like composition of the asbestos fibers allow them to cling to the lining of the body's internal organs (most generally the lungs) for decades before an afflicted individual may begin to experience symptoms common in [mesothelioma cancer](#) patients, such as breathing difficulties and a lingering, painful cough.

Mesothelioma has a latent period of between 20 and 50 years, so the average newly-diagnosed patient is between the ages of 50 and 70. Because this type of cancer is extremely aggressive, most mesothelioma sufferers will lose their battle with this disease in less than 2 years following their diagnosis. There is no cure, but there are a variety of [mesothelioma treatment](#) methods available, including chemo and combination drug therapies.

Mesothelioma (also known as asbestos cancer) is always fatal, but it also happens to be completely avoidable. Over 35 million residences within the U.S. may harbor asbestos-laden products, and countless commercial buildings and schools that were constructed prior to EPA regulations may also contain this deadly toxin. In an effort to protect your health and the health of your loved ones, it is advisable to avoid contact with asbestos at all costs. If your home does contain asbestos materials, it is imperative that you hire a licensed asbestos abatement contractor to handle removal and disposal in a safe manner. If you must tackle a do-it-yourself asbestos removal project, it is wise to wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth at all times and to dispose of clothing worn during exposure to avoid exposing loved ones or transferring errant fibers from one location to another.

Homeowners are not the only individuals at risk: veterans, firefighters, construction workers and miners are also at a heightened risk of one day developing mesothelioma as a result of occupational asbestos exposure.

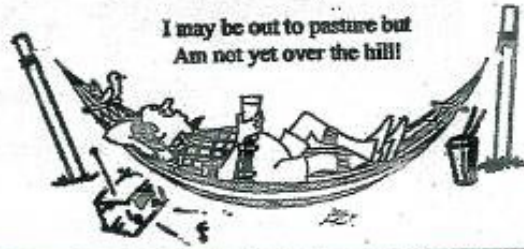

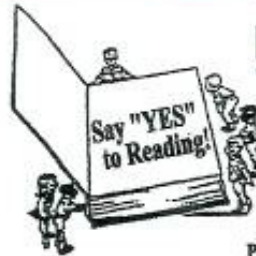
